## **SOLICITORS REGULATION AUTHORITY DIVERSITY DATA**

In 2011, the Legal Services Board published their decision paper on increasing diversity and social mobility in the legal workforce. This requires regulators, such as the SRA to ensure there is a comprehensive evidence base about the diversity characteristics of the legal workforces available.

All firms regulated by the SRA are required to collect, report and publish workforce diversity data about the diversity makeup of their workforce.

The requirements apply to all firms regulated by the SRA, including sole practises, recognised bodies and alternative business structures.
